## — REFLECTIONS —

A mountain climber who slipped on a wet rock found himself clinging to a small branch jutting over a 900-foot drop. In desperation he looked up to the sky and shouted “Is anybody up there?” A booming voice answered him: “It is the Lord, my son and I will help you but first you must have faith in me.” “Yes, yes, I trust you!” cried the man. “Let go of the branch,” said the Lord. “What?” shouted the man. “Let go of the branch,” the voice said again. There was a long pause, and the man shouted up again, “IS THERE ANYONE ELSE UP THERE I COULD TALK TO?”

Trusting God with our lives is easier said than done. It requires the spiritual discipline of surrendering our lives to God fully. Most of us would rather do anything else. It’s fine to go to church on Sunday and learn a few “feel good” lessons, but surrendering? That’s a different story. We don’t like the word “surrender,” especially us Westerners. It implies giving up and loss of control and we never give up. It’s in our DNA as Americans.

The truth is, however, while we hesitate to surrender to God, we unconsciously surrender to many other things or people all the time, in particular our fears and distractions. While we protest trusting God, we wrongly believe we must trust ourselves. In reality we are trusting values created by a society that more often than not does not have our best interests in mind. We become enslaved by our fears, thinking we are free. We give ourselves over to the pursuit of things, or contrive ways to control our lives in attempts to resist surrendering to anything.

It often takes a crisis or tragedy to quickly remind us how little control we have over our lives. It often takes humility to recognize how much we need to depend on the promises of God.

Surrendering to God, trusting God, has nothing to do with giving up. Instead it is giving God permission to act in our lives. It is a giving over, allowing God to fulfill God’s dream for us.

This campaign season has been ripe with rhetoric of individualism. The strong leader is the leader who won’t take anything from anyone. But as Christians we follow a leader who surrendered himself to God completely in order to show strength in what the world calls weakness.

May we, in this season of Pentecost, open ourselves to the presence of the Holy Spirit allowing God to work in, with and through us. It is precisely in surrendering to God that we become free.
